Dike repairs are eyed

Blue skies and rising temperatures aren't helping Estral Beach residents forget the flood damage incurred last month, and as in other communities, the dikes are in need of repair and funds are scarce.

Stanley Nietubicz questioned the Village Council Tuesday night on procedures used in investi-

gating the dikes.

At the present time, the Army Corp of Engineers make a routine examination of the dikes once a year, however, reports on dike conditions are slow in returning to the village, according to council members.

A report from last year's inspection, made in July, wasn't received until this February.

The dike commissioner, Dan Knierim, stated. "I inspect the dikes at least once a week, but no formal written reports are submitted to the board." He said he frequently relates his observations of dike conditions to the council at the meetings and this informationis documented in the minutes.

The village does have a dike fund available for minor repairs, but major renovation of the dikes is not foreseen. The purchase of clay "that won't wash away," at a reasonable price is needed now to complete and repair many of the

existing dikes, Knierin said.

"We are working on it." said Village President Frank Borbely. "If you don't have the money, you can't go to a real good restaurant."

"I never saw so much junk leave Estral Beach," he added.
